#### From the Rector...

Back in 1976, a theologian by the name of John Westerhoff authored a book entitled, "Will Our Children Have Faith?" I think all of us would agree we would like to answer with a responding "YES" to that question. To

achieve that result, in his landmark book Professor Westerhoff challenged the church to not merely teach about the Bible, but help our children to learn to live as disciples of Jesus


Christ. It is that mode of thinking that has guided the development of our Christian education and formation programs in the intervening years.

Here at Saint Joseph's, the adoption of the "Child in our Hands" program, and the corresponding "Hand in Hand" process, is our way of doing this for our children and youth. "Faith is caught, not taught," while a bit overused as a phrase, still adequately captures our approach. In addition, the formation of the Journey to Adulthood program for our youth has been our way of helping to blend learning the faith with experiencing the faith.

It is the balancing of the healthy tension between learning and living the faith that continues to drive the children & youth programs at Saint Joseph's:

We concluded in June the biggest ever Vacation Church Camp. What an incredible experience for 200 children. Not only did they learn about Jesus for the first time, but they experienced Jesus in the over 100 volunteers who loved and shepherded them through the week.

As you read this, I am traveling with 14 youth pilgrims and their facilitators on their Journey to Adulthood pilgrimage. This is an incredible experience that our church offers to our youth. Many Anglicans live their whole life without fulfilling their dream of visiting the holy places of Iona, Lindisfarne and Canterbury. It is a testimony to your commitment to passing on the faith that we offer this learning and experience to our youth. Does it make a difference? Just ask any of the former J2A class, who up until



departure date were trying to figure out how to sneak into our luggage.

• We are now in the final stages of hiring a permanent full-time youth minister. Brie Hurley has done a commendable job of jumping in with her head and heart for this past year. What a blessing it is to have a church that continues to value and support a customized program for our youth.

Reverend Dick Hardel, the creator of the "Child in our Hands" program,

always reminds us in his talks that the church is the only institution that will always be one generation away from extinction. I hope that you share in my excitement that we are doing all that we can to ensure our most precious gift of faith is passed on to our children.

- If you are seeking a new Church home, either as an Episcopalian or as one interested in entering the Episcopal Church, we hope that you will give us the opportunity to speak with you in your home or at one of our many services. The Church Office is open Monday thru Friday—8:00 am to 3:00 pm. We are available to answer any questions you might have.
- If you have decided you wish to become a member of Saint Joseph's and you are already a Confirmed Communicant of the Episcopal Church, we can assist you in requesting a Letter of transfer from your former Parish.
- If you are not a member of any other Church and have decided that Saint Joseph's is where you want to be, there are membership forms that are available through the Church Office. Simply fill them in and return to the Office.

- If you wish to become a pledging member of Saint Joseph's Church, there are pledge cards located in the back of the Church (Narthex) or in the Parish Office. What does it mean to become a pledging member? A pledging member is when you have decided to make a financial commitment to support Saint Joseph's Church and the various ministries that are offered here. When you become a pledging member, you are able to participate in the election of vestry members at the annual meeting.
- If at any time you wish to speak with the Rector, just call the Church Office at (561) 732-3060 between the hours of 8:00 am to 3:00 pm—Monday thru Thursday. If he is unavailable when you call, his assistant will make sure that he receives your message, and will call back at the earliest convenience.
- If you wish to join one of our various ministries, the back of the bulletin has the names of all our ministry leaders and which ministry they lead. Should you wish to contact any of them, there is a Parish Directory available with everyone's phone number and address.

# SENIOR SERMON



#### JUNE 2007

For those of you who don't know me, I'm Shannon Poirier and I've been attending Saint Joseph's church since I was ten years old and have been an Episcopalian all my life. On Behalf of all the seniors of Saint Josephs, I would not only like to congratulate ourselves but also the loving parish that has helped support all of our endeavors through the knowing of Jesus. Since I was little both my parents, Brad and Dawna Poirier have instilled in me the knowing of Jesus, but it wasn't until the journey I took with my fellow youth group members that really led me to have a full understanding of what being a Christian means to me today.

As I went through middle school and high school being a Christian and doing the Christian thing wasn't at all the way I saw the things around me happening. Middle school was full of days where I was trying to fit in, wear the right things, and nonchalantly repeat cool jokes I'd heard even if they were inappropriate. But every Sunday my mother would trot me and my brother here, to Saint Josephs. In middle school I was known as the "church girl", and for some reason at that point in my life I resented that name so bad. Kids would ask me to do things on Saturday and to spend the night, but I couldn't - I had church on Sunday, or I was doing something with church on that Saturday night. To them I would act as though it was a chore for me to come to church things, but on the inside I was really stoked to be spending my weekends with my "church friends". Weekend after weekend I started really getting to love the people I was hanging out with, and I was always loving the things we would do together. Three of the people I became especially close with were Adam Pulda, Nick Zalewski and Gillian Baker. Four complete strangers at one point were becoming the best friends I'd ever have, and it wasn't until a few years later that I'd even realize that.

As I aged a few years, I was privileged to attend Kanuga, a church retreat held in North Carolina. Gillian and Nick were so excited to go, and don't get me wrong- I was excited but I wasn't exactly sure what I was getting myself into and that made me nervous. Nevertheless I boarded the bus and had no idea the spiritual change I was about to experience. The week we spent at Kanuga was amazing. I met kids from all over the United states that were not ashamed at all of loving their Savior. The first meeting we had everyone was dancing and singing to "Jesus songs",- I was so confused. I was used to people making fun of me for just going to church. What would people think about them prancing around and singing about Jesus? Even my older brother Jesse was dancing around, so I figured Jesus must be pretty great if he can make my brother dance. That week to me was comparable to what I think heaven will be like, a bunch of happy people being kind to each other and accepting each other for exactly who they are.

When I returned home from Kanuga I was on what they call a "Jesus high". I was ready to go out there and spread the word. I had changed that week, but the people around me really hadn't, and I still found myself being made fun of; the big difference was I didn't really care anymore. A few more years passed and I was rocking steady with the Saint Josephs youth group. I never missed a Sunday and if I did Gillian would always call me to see where I was. In high school I had a few rough spots, and at times I did forget about the one person who's always going to be there for me, Jesus. In the midst of all the new classes, new friends, and hectic sports schedules I started missing a few more Sundays and started hanging out with my church friends less. I would pray every now and then but I was really at a point where I wasn't sure how I even felt about going to church and Jesus anymore. Even in the midst of this, I still continued to go to church but I wasn't always mentally there.

Next thing I knew the year had come for our pilgrimage to Scotland. I started coming to church more and hanging out with my church friends again. I even stopped at one point and thought, how could I ever have doubted my faith? The people at Saint Josephs have a love like no other, and that's because its Gods love.

The pilgrimage to Scotland made me realize how grateful I was to have had loving parents, and friends to show me Jesus and to never stop pushing me to love him more. Throughout my entire life I had always known Jesus, but it wasn't until the end of my Scotland pilgrimage that I think I really accepted him into my life and was really willing to live every moment exactly how He has intended me too. I was ready to cut off the hand that was causing me to stumble. During our pilgrimage the youth and also the adults on the trip bonded in way that's simply unexplainable. I got to see Gods light and gifts that he had given each individual and seeing those wonderful things shed a different light on the way I view each person. Day after day our youth that went on the pilgrimage separates a little bit more, but it's okay. We have all shared our happiest moments, and some of our saddest side by side. We have watched each other grow and learned from one another what friendship really means. We have truly learned the bible verse from 1 Corinthians 12:4- Indeed the body does not consist of one member but of many. As it is there are many members yet one body. If one Member suffers, all suffer together with it. Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. Without Saint Josephs and the community that comes along with the church, I truly don't think I would be the person I am today.



Without a loving community in the church, all it really is, is just a building.

The next few years I plan on becoming a Nurse through my schooling at Florida Gulf Coast University. I am excited and scared, but mostly excited because of the support I have had my entire life from the people around me. And also because I know that with Jesus anything is possible. I will miss the community here at saint Josephs immensely, but I am proud and privileged to go out into this world and bring the love that has been shared with me to everyone I meet. I have learned not only through the youth at St. Joseph's. I will also take special gifts that Bobbie Smith, Dee Zlatic and Gene and Diane have shared with me. A gift they all share in common is the ability to be friendly, warm and simply delightful to be around. Through these loving adults I have learned how much simply smiling at someone can mean and how loving can change people or even an entire community.

As 1 Corinthians 13 says: If I speak eloquence in angelic ecstasy but don't love, I'm nothing but the creaking of a rusty gate. If I speak gods word with power, revealing all his mysteries and making everything plan as day, and if I have faith that says to a mountain, " jump", and it jumps, but I don't love, I'm nothing. If I give everything I own to the poor and even go to the stake to be burned as a martyr, but I don't love, I've gotten no where. So, no matter what I say, what I believe, and what I do, I'm bankrupt without love.

Love never gives up. Love cares more for others than for self. Love doesn't want what it doesn't have. Love doesn't strut, doesn't have a swelled head, doesn't force itself on others, isn't always "me first", doesn't fly off the handle, doesn't keep score of the sins of others, doesn't revel when others grovel, takes pleasure in flowering of truth, puts up with everything, trusts god always, always looks for the best, never looks back, but keeps going to the end.

Love never dies. Inspired speech will be over one day; praying in tongues will end; understanding will reach its limit. We know only a portion of the truth, and what we say about god is always incomplete. But when the complete arrives, our incompletes will be canceled.

When I was an infant at my mothers breast, I gurgled and cooed like an infant. When I grew up, I left those infant ways for good. We don't yet see things clearly. We're squinting in a fog, peering through a mist. But it won't be long before the weather clears and the sun shines bright! We'll see it all then, see it all as clearly as god sees us, knowing him directly as he knows us!

But for right now, until that completeness, we have three things to do to lead us toward that consummation; trust steadily in god, hope unswervingly, love extravagantly, an the best of these three is love.

As I journey off to college, and my adult life, I hope to take the gift of Gods love with me wherever I end up. I will no longer resent the name church girl, but I will wear it proudly and represent the name as willingly and lovingly as the community right here at Saint Josephs has taught me how. **Thank you**.

## FINANCIAL UPDATE AS OF JUNE 30, 07

As we begin the second half of the year, the Financial Committee would like to present our current financial status to the members of St. Joseph's Church. The pledge income is \$16,539 below the budgeted amount. This deficit is a

direct result of losing some of our pledging members as well as some of our pledges being behind. Please review your six month contribution statement and bring your pledge up to date if possible. If you did not receive your statement, please call the church office and a statement will be mailed to you. Thank you for your continued support of our church and its mission.

It takes a great deal of money to run a church of our size, especially when we experience unexpected, unbudgeted repairs and equipment replacement. During the first half of this year this amounted to more than \$40,000.

Basically, the computer network failed and we had to rework the entire system in addition to replacing two computers for a cost of \$10,273. The front doors of the church were not operational and we could not even lock them securely. They were replaced at a cost of \$11,000. Two air conditioners failed and were replaced for the sum of \$7,150. We are in the process of completing roof leak repairs, power washing the roof, re-caulking all the glass in the stained glass windows, and replacing the rooftop cross lost during the hurricanes of two years ago. We will complete this work as soon as possible, but we feel it is prudent to coordinate all the roof work at one time to make economical use of a rental high lift.

We were able to pay for these unexpected expenses because we received several contributions and anonymous donations to our church, some specifically ear marked for our "Building Fund". We thank God for these wonderful contributions that paid for this work.

Our regular expenses are in line with the budget at this time. We invite members new and old who have not yet pledged, to join us in contributing to the ongoing mission of our church. Contribution cards are available in the church pews or in the office.

Thank you all again for all you give in time, talent and treasure.

## A Study of Church History and Denominationalism

Many of the participants in the Monday Night Small Group (that have focused a great deal on a study of the New Testa-

ment books) have been asking a lot of questions about Church History – especially how certain creeds and practices and theological ideas have developed. So, guess what? We are doing a study of church history with an emphasis on the development of Christian denominations.

We have covered the early church with the break into the Western (Roman) and Eastern (Orthodox) Churches, and the schism in the Western church with a papacy in Rome and Avignon (France). And we have covered the persons of John Wycliffe and John Hus who were precursors to the Reformation. With our study in July focusing on the Reformation, we will examine Luther, Zwingli, and Calvin.

If members wish to have an overall book I have recommended Justo Gonzales' <u>The Story of</u> <u>Christianity</u> (volume 1 goes up to the Reformation, volume 2 goes to modern times). New, each book is about \$23.00 through Amazon.com. You can buy them used for \$9.99 each.

Through Channing Bete Publications, 8 booklets (each covering a different denomination) have been secured. Each is about 16 pages and gives a concise presentation on the essentials of that denomination. You can get these from Father William, and if you can afford it, a \$10 donation to the church is recommended to cover the cost.

The Monday Night Small Group invites all to join us anytime you can and with whatever sessions you are able to attend. We begin at 6:00 PM with a pot-luck fellowship or you can join us for class only at 6:30 to 8:00 PM. We end each session with a time for communal prayer. NOTE that we will NOT MEET July 23, July 30, and August 7 while Father William is on the Scotland Pilgrimage with our J2A Pilgrims.

**Community Emergency Response Team** 

A **Community Emergency Response Team (CERT)**, is a group of volunteer emergency workers who have received basic training in disaster preparedness, fire suppression, basic disaster medical operations, light search and rescue, and team operations. They are designed to act as an auxiliary to existing emergency responders in the event of a major disaster such as a hurricane. In major emergencies, professional emergency services overload quickly. The most basic goal of the CERT program is preparedness. The belief is that a civilian who receives the CERT training is more likely to prepare in advance for a major disaster and is aware of the proper steps to take after such a disaster. This reduces the likelihood that they will need assistance from emergency responders and thus relieves pressure on scarce resources such as rescuers and their equipment.

#### Parishioners and friends of St. Joseph's

I am a CERT Team Member as well as an Instructor for this important and life saving course you can take. I find it not only rewarding but informational and extremely beneficial to all. You can be a part of something that is of great necessity to your community; your families and yourself. It will help you grow as a person and recognize the desperate need for help in the event of a disaster.

Properly trained citizens can become a tremendous response resource in an emergency. Palm Beach County, in partnership with Palm Beach Community College and the United Way of Palm Beach County, maintains a citizen training pro-

gram known as CERT (Community Emergency Response Team). This program is designed to focus on hurricanes and other potential emergencies common to Palm Beach County. The Community College, through the adult education program, coordinates and provides the training; the United Way of Palm Beach is providing scholarship funds for the CERT program; and PBC Emergency Management assists graduates with starting a CERT in their own neighborhood and/or community. They can also be integrated into an existing CERT.

There is NO COST for this. training A grant from the Federal Government will cover your classes and education; and PBC Emergency Management will provide a starter kit including a back pack with essentials to get you going. You will also get a Palm Beach County ID badge with picture. If you are interested, please contact me or pick up a form in the church office and fill it out as directed. If we can get 20 people I will be to set up a class through The City of Boynton Beach Fire/Rescue. It will consist of 2 days or evenings a week, from either 9-12 daytime hours; 1-4 pm; or 6:30-9:30 in the evenings. It runs for four (4) weeks, or a total of eight (8) classes.

Anyone can do this from ages 18 up. I have CERT members who are in there 90's; wheel chair bound, and people who are not in the best of health. A person in a wheel chair can cut up sheets to make bandages; and do various assorted tasks that are extremely necessary for the rest of us out in the field taking care of a disaster.

The op-ed page of the May 12 editions of The New York Times carried a display ad marking the beginnings, 400 years ago, of the Jamestown Colony and the Episcopal Church's heritage and mission in North America.



## The Episcopal Church Marking a Milestone, Moving Forward

Somewhere near you, there's a blue-and-white sign bearing the familiar slogan: The Episcopal Church Welcomes You. It represents some 7,400 congregations that trace their beginnings in North America to a small but hopeful group of English Christians who arrived May 14, 1607 at a place they called Jamestown — the first permanent English settlement in the New World.

You may know us as Washington's monumental National Cathedral, site of historic services and ceremonies, or the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York, still unfinished, but already the largest cathedral in the world.

But the Episcopal Church is also Boston's Old North

Church, founded in 1723 and made famous by serving as the beacon for Paul Revere's revolution-spurring "midnight ride." And Philadelphia's Christ Church, home parish of 15 signers of the Declaration of Independence, host to the first General Convention of the Episcopal Church in 1785.

It's Trinity Parish on Wall Street in New York, formed in 1698, and St. Paul's Chapel just down the street, frequented by George Washington and the spiritual healing center of Ground Zero since September 11, 2001.

It's also Epiphany Church in Los Angeles, where Cesar Chavez rallied the United Farmworkers. And Emmanuel Episcopal Church in Cumberland, Maryland, whose basement was a major stop on the Underground Railroad to freedom for enslaved African-Americans. And St. John's Church in Greenwich Village, a meeting place for gay and lesbian action following the 1969 Stonewall uprising.

It's a parish in Iowa. A campus ministry in Georgia. A mission in Dinétah — the Navajo Reservation. A cathedral in Utah. Even a house church in Vermont. Wherever you find us, you'll find the Book of Common Prayer and a Christian faith that honors and engages the Bible, the tradition of the Church, and God-given human reason.

Joined in prayer, you'll find people with many points of view — Christians who are progressive, moderate, and conservative — yet who value the diversity of their faith community.

That's a heritage drawn from our deep roots in nearly 2,000 years of English Christianity, and shared by a worldwide Anglican Communion that unites nearly 80 million people in 164 countries through prayer and ministries committed to caring for "the least of these," as Jesus commanded, by reducing poverty, disease, and oppression.

Episcopalians struggle with the same issues that trou-

ble all people of faith: how to interpret an ancient faith for today... how to maintain the integrity of tradition while reaching out to a hurting world... how to disagree and yet love and respect one another.

Occasionally those struggles make the news. People find they can no longer walk with us on their journey, and may be called to a different spiritual home. Some later make their way back, and find they are welcomed with open arms.

Despite the headlines, the Episcopal Church keeps moving forward in mission — in all 50 U.S. states

and the District of Columbia, as well as congregations in Belgium, Colombia, the Dominican Republic, Ecuador, France, Germany, Guam, Haiti, Honduras, Italy, Micronesia, Puerto Rico, Switzerland, Taiwan, Venezuela, and the Virgin Islands. We're committed to a transformed world, as Jesus taught: a world of justice, peace, wholeness, and holy living.

We've grown a lot in 400 years, since that 1607 worship service from the Book of Common Prayer was held in Jamestown — inside and out. Come see for yourself. Come and visit... come and explore... come and grow.



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
